1 MR. PETERS: I'd like to call to order
2 the North Canton City Council meeting,
3 Monday, June 10th, 7:00 p.m.

4 Opening prayer. Mark.

5 MS. BROWN: Call the roll.

6 MR. PETERS: Oh.

7 MS. BROWN: Sorry.

8 MR. PETERS: No.

9 MS. BROWN: Sorry.

10 MR. PETERS: Opening prayer. Mark.

11 (Whereupon, Mr. Cerreta lead opening
12 prayer.)

13 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance was
14 recited.)

15 MR. PETERS: All right. Laura, will you
16 please call the roll?

17 MS. BROWN: Peters.

18 MR. PETERS: Here.

19 MS. BROWN: Foltz.

20 MR. FOLTZ: Here.

21 MS. BROWN: Cerreta.

22 MR. CERRETA: Here.

23 MS. BROWN: Revoldt.

7 MR. PETERS: All right. Thank you very
8 much.

9 Before we go into consideration here, I
10 need a motion to amend Special Council
11 meeting minutes, May 23rd, 2019, page 7, line
12 13; speaking, it should be Ms. -- Mrs.
13 Werren.

14 MR. REVOLDT: So moved.

15 MR. FOLTZ: Second.

16 MR. PETERS: All in favor?

17 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.

18 MR. PETERS: Aye.

19 MR. CERRETA: Aye.

20 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

21 MS. KIESLING: Aye.

22 MS. WERREN: Aye.

23 MR. FONTE: Aye.

24 MR. PETERS: Opposed?

25 (No response.)

1 MR. PETERS: Motion carries, seven, O.
2 Okay. Thank you. For your
3 consideration, I need a motion and a second
4 to approve as presented Special Committee --
5 Special Committee of the Whole meeting
6 minutes, May 13th, 2019, Council meeting
7 minutes, May 13, 2019, Committee of the Whole
8 meeting minutes, May 20th, 2019, Special
9 Council meeting minutes, May 20th, 2019,
10 Special Council meeting minutes, May 21,
11 2019, and Special Council meeting minutes as
12 amended, May 23rd, 2019, and, finally,
13 financial report, April of 2019.

14 MR. FOLTZ: Motion to consider as
15 amended.

16 MR. CERRETA: Second.

17 MR. PETERS: All in favor?

18 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.

19 MR. PETERS: Aye.

20 MR. CERRETA: Aye.

21 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

22 MS. KIESLING: Aye.

23 MS. WERREN: Aye.

24 MR. PETERS: Opposed?

25 MR. FONTE: Nay.

1 MR. PETERS: Nay?

2 MR. FONTE: Or I meant abstain. Sorry.

3 MR. PETERS: Abstain. Fonte abstains.

4 Okay. At this time, if you wish to
5 address Council, please step forward, state
6 your name and address for the record. Just a
7 reminder, there is a five-minute time limit.
8 And if you have questions for Council,
9 they'll be addressed at the end of the
10 meeting, during -- or after Council reports.
11 Chuck.

12 MR. OSBORNE: Chuck Osborne, 307 Fairview
13 Street, Southeast, North Canton, Ohio. I
14 often wonder if anybody really realizes why
15 we even have these meetings. Why do we have
16 the processes we have? Why there is a paper
17 trail for these processes.

18 You seven are elected representatives.
19 But I don't see much representation of the
20 public going on at all. Here is my
21 experience with City government here in the
22 last week. At a recent Zoning Board of
23 Appeals meeting -- which Mrs. Kiesling and
24 Mrs. Werren have pushed through legislation
25 and a change on the charter that they don't

1 want to attend. This last meeting of the ZBA
2 was very interesting. And, first, I'll get
3 to the push for one of your resolutions
4 tonight, changing the name of the meetings to
5 adjudication. I dare say, all of you have
6 been to college up here, right? Mr. Fonte
7 said no.

8 MR. FONTE: No.

9 MR. OSBORNE: But the ones of you who --
10 who have, did you know you matriculated?
11 Does anybody know what matriculation means?
12 You enrolled in college. But how often do we
13 say that? Hey, I'm going to go matriculate
14 next week, or your kids tell you -- or you
15 pushed your kids; you need to matriculate
16 soon, so you get the classes you want or
17 whatever. That means enrolling in college,
18 simple as that.

19 Adjudication, yes, nobody has argued that
20 we are not adjudicating property rights at a
21 Zoning Board of Appeals meeting. Nobody has
22 ever denied that. But how often do we
23 utilize -- utilize that terminology? Does
24 anybody even know what it means?

25 There is absolutely no reason to change

1 this from public hearing to adjudication.
2 None. There was never any denial that we are
3 adjudication property rights. It has stood
4 for 60 years in this City. It's intimidating
5 to the public.

6 And then to tell them, we are going to
7 cross-examine you. Now, I was cross-examined
8 by Law Director Fox this last week,
9 Wednesday. He felt that he has a duty, as
10 the legal representative, to cross-examine
11 me. And his main point was to ask me where I
12 live. To point out that, hey, you have no
13 dog in the fight. Because this was an issue
14 over on Penny.

15 Nobody is denying that I lived in
16 proximity and I was going to be immediately
17 impacted. But every citizen has an interest
18 in seeing our laws that are carried out.
19 Otherwise, why even have a -- a hearing?
20 Just invite the party who wants the variance
21 and the parties who are immediately impacted,
22 and exclude everybody else.

23 So there is no reason to change this at
24 all. It has worked for years. People are
25 not going to come up here and lie on the

1 record and have it preserved for 150 years in
2 the records. We have plenty of commission
3 members who are sensible enough, appointed by
4 our Mayor. They can judge the testimony as
5 presented to them, whether they think it's
6 beneficial, impactful, or has no bearing on
7 the situation.

8 So there is no reason for this. You are
9 just creating power authority for Mr. Fox.
10 He's placing himself as the jury, and he's
11 leading these commission members.

12 Lastly, before my time runs out, I've
13 made a records request. And it's repeatedly
14 denied. I copied everybody here at City
15 Hall, because I'm tired of playing games,
16 what I call whack-a-mole. I ask the wrong
17 person for the record, because they can
18 conceivably say, I don't have it. When they
19 know, in fact, they did have it or they could
20 have it, but they've handed it off to
21 somebody else.

22 So I have asked you seven and made you
23 aware. I'm hoping you can help me with these
24 records requests. Otherwise, you leave me no
25 choice but to go through the claims process

1 in Columbus, and then with an attorney. I
2 have already talked to an attorney.

3 MR. PETERS: Thank you, Mr. Osborne.
4 Your time is up. Thank you very much, sir.

5 MR. FONTE: Thank you.

6 MR. PETERS: Anyone else wishing to
7 address Council, please step forward, state
8 your -- yes, sir.

9 MR. PUSTAY: Steven Pustay, 3593
10 Dovershire, Massillon, Ohio.

11 THE REPORTER: Can you start over again,
12 please?

13 MR. PUSTAY: Steven Pustay, P-u-s-t-a-y,
14 3593 Dovershire, Northwest, Massillon, Ohio.
15 And I have some materials I'd like to leave
16 for Council's consideration, if I can.

17 MR. PETERS: Yeah.

18 MR. PUSTAY: Thank you. My name is Steve
19 Pustay, and I'm here representing Terry
20 Marshall, a North Canton resident and board
21 member of the Hall of Fame City Pickleball
22 Club, who was hospitalized yesterday and is
23 unable to attend this evening. I'm here
24 representing, as well, the members of the
25 Hall of Fame City Pickleball Club and its 154

1 members, the Northeast Ohio Pickleball Club
2 and its nearly 200 members, the First Friends
3 pickleball mail serve list, with over 325
4 members, and as a United States Pickleball
5 Association ambassador for Massillon Jackson,
6 Ohio, more than 3 million active pickleball
7 players across the country.

8 I'm here first and foremost to thank you
9 for your generous support of the fastest
10 growing sport in the United states and your
11 installation of the new pickleball courts on
12 Glenwood Avenue in North Canton.

13 As an ambassador of the USAPA, one of my
14 primary roles is to provide support for
15 communities in installation, maintenance,
16 funding, and design of court facilities. And
17 I offer, not as a criticism, but as an
18 example of our services, a few brief examples
19 and excerpts from the Pickleball Courts
20 Construction Manual that is funded by
21 American Sports Builders Association on
22 behalf of the USAPA.

23 Given the existing footprint of the court
24 surface at Glenwood Avenue, using USAPA
25 recommended championship court overruns,

1 which are larger than normal, the document
2 provided will show you that you could have
3 easily placed six courts where you have four.
4 If you had installed the smaller provisional
5 court structure, as also recommended by the
6 USAPA, without any additional cost, you could
7 have installed eight courts at that location.

8 And we say that just as a reference to
9 let you know that by contacting USAPA and
10 making those requests, we can help advise in
11 that way. We believe that for costs of less
12 than \$5,000, the existing fencing could have
13 been kept and the courts could have been
14 completed.

15 However, I'm also pleased to tell you
16 that your courts are in full use. For the
17 first time tomorrow, we're going to be
18 running a pickleball clinic. We will have 16
19 members of your community attending an HOFPC
20 stroke clinic.

21 We have also contracted for the first of
22 what we anticipate will be an annual
23 pickleball tournament called the Firecracker
24 Tournament, to coincide with your July 4th
25 run. And we have 16 mixed doubles teams

1 already signed up, and we expect that
2 tournament will grow within the next three
3 weeks, before registration closes. Your
4 courts are already in use by -- on a regular
5 basis, on Wednesdays, with a league that is
6 playing there, and we anticipate those
7 numbers will grow, as well.

8 The USAPA is also mindful of making
9 communities aware of modest, but growing
10 potential for court use fees. For example,
11 last week, the Benjamin F. Edwards tournament
12 held on the courts in Mentor, Ohio garnered
13 the City a \$1,000 use fee. Tournament
14 directors there told me that the City
15 receives nearly \$4,000 in annual use fees for
16 tournaments, shoot-outs, and leagues.

17 Canton City stadium courts are currently
18 drawing 20 percent of tournament entry fees
19 from all HOFC events held there. And Joe
20 Harold, the tournament director for our club,
21 believes that by the end of the summer, more
22 than \$500 will be returned to the City in
23 usage fees.

24 Additionally, larger tournaments, like
25 the Mentor tournament, which draws

1 participants from five states, and Canada, as
2 well, brings thousands of extra dollars of
3 revenue to local hotels and restaurants and
4 other vendors in the area.

5 Finally, I would be remiss if I did not
6 call your attention to some issues in the
7 surface installation on the Glenwood courts,
8 which we have previously addressed with some
9 City officials. There are not an
10 insignificant number of surface bubbles,
11 which prevent a clean and accurate bounce of
12 the ball. I have played dozens of matches on
13 all four of your courts. We found all four
14 courts to have some serious dead spots, which
15 makes recreational play and tournament play
16 difficult and problematic.

17 I believe that the outstanding location
18 and design of the Glenwood courts will allow
19 for the seeds of future tournaments that can
20 draw from across the state and urge you to
21 consider efforts to correct the issues with
22 the surface of the courts, so that your City,
23 your taxpayers, and your pickleball community
24 will be proud of the installation there.
25 Thank you for your time.

1 MR. PETERS: Thank you, sir.

2 MR. HELD: Very good. Thank you.

3 MS. WERREN: Thank you.

4 MR. FONTE: Thank you, Steve.

5 MR. PETERS: Yes, sir.

6 MR. LAYMAN: Good evening. I'm Vince
7 Layman of 1494 Swigart Road, in New Franklin,
8 Ohio. I'm here from Johnson Controls, and
9 just wanted to take a couple of minutes to
10 reference or clarify some things for
11 Ordinance both 28 and 29.

12 I know that, you know, over the course of
13 the last couple Council meetings, there have
14 been some questions with respect to -- or
15 some -- maybe some confusion; additional
16 information needed with respect to the
17 process of how we would go through and
18 implement a project as described in both of
19 those ordinances, and the study associated
20 with that.

21 To that end, I want to just kind of give
22 some clarification to that. As we go through
23 and put a project like this together, the way
24 that we normally start out is we go through
25 and do a complete feasibility study, to look

1 at all the different alternatives and the
2 different options the City would have in
3 order to move through; in this case, the
4 implementation of a sludge press over at the
5 water treatment plant.

6 And in doing that, it kind of draws out a
7 little bit of the time associated with
8 putting a project like that together. In the
9 case of the City of North Canton here, we
10 have a little bit of an advantage. And that
11 advantage is that Mark and Robert and -- and
12 some other people have been pretty diligent,
13 actually, which is nice for us -- it's not
14 something we see all the time -- in going
15 through and investigating, you know,
16 different options that are out there.

17 And you kind of have an idea of where you
18 want to go, with a plate style sludge press
19 with that. And that's great, and that may be
20 the way that makes most sense for you to do,
21 but what we would be doing as we move forward
22 into this is doing a feasibility study,
23 although it would be a somewhat truncated
24 one, to provide you with information with
25 respect to life cycle costing and the overall

1 pros and cons of the various technologies
2 that are out there, in order to determine the
3 best way for you to go and allow you to make
4 a more informed decision.

5 Once that is done, the next step in the
6 process is that we actually go through and
7 start putting the design together. As we put
8 the design together, we work with our
9 engineering teams, along with, in conjunction
10 with, multiple contractors to put together
11 the concept on the pricing once you have an
12 idea of where you want to go. And we would
13 help you in making that -- that idea of where
14 you want to go. And that's what the
15 feasibility study would be for.

16 Upon -- or during that process, we put
17 together sets of drawings and schematics and
18 what-have-you that come into play for things
19 like, for example, loans or sloans offered by
20 DPW that are -- really come into play in
21 October. So you want to have an application
22 set up in September for those. We would have
23 a package together and work with you to help
24 procure that and move forward to get that in
25 play as you move forward with this project.

1 The other thing that we look at are any
2 additional grants and things that are out
3 there, as well, to help from a funding aspect
4 of this, to give you options with that, so it
5 can give you, you know, a whole, I guess,
6 array of not only the possible solutions and
7 the life cycle costing with that, but also
8 the opportunities for ways to fund that
9 outside of this.

10 Now, we work with this in a partnership
11 with you in order to make sure that you can
12 make the decision that you are most
13 comfortable with, that best fits the needs of
14 the City and of the constituents that you
15 have throughout the City, to make sure it's
16 an effective and efficient process.

17 As we do that, we get multiple pricing
18 then from the contractors. We go through and
19 implement it from the standpoint of providing
20 project management, construction management,
21 as well as dealing with helping you move
22 forward with the EPA permitting requirements,
23 because you are going to have to get a
24 re-permit on the plant in order to operate
25 it, because this is a change of process for

1 you.

2 So we would help you and assist you in
3 putting all that together as you move
4 forward, as well. Once that's done and
5 implementation is complete, our teams make
6 sure that, in fact, it's done correctly, that
7 it meets the intent that you had as you move
8 forward, and that it's done at no change
9 orders or no cost increases. That's --
10 that's one of the things -- one of the
11 reasons, quite frankly, that I do what I want
12 do right now.

13 Because as you come to us, you are coming
14 to us as experts. You should treat us as
15 experts. You should expect that we give you
16 the best opportunities, and that as we go
17 through and indicate to you what the costs
18 are to implement this, that there is no cost
19 overruns or change orders associated with
20 that.

21 Upon completion of the project, we then
22 would go through and work with your staff to
23 help from a training perspective. Because
24 once this is put together, whichever system
25 you decide to use, once the system is put

1 together, there is ongoing maintenance. It's
2 a mechanical system. That's going to happen.
3 And there are operating constraints and
4 requirements that you have to do in order to
5 comply and meet with the EPA guidelines for
6 your operating permits. So we help you put
7 all that together, as well.

8 In essence, what we are doing is
9 providing you with a turnkey type of
10 implementation, to allow you to go through
11 and get not only the most efficient, the best
12 long-term operating process as you move
13 forward into this, the best funding
14 measurements that you can work with, and
15 prepare you to operate it, not only today,
16 but well into the future, to make sure that
17 this is a good decision, not only today, but
18 a good decision well down the road.

19 And that's why we would like to be your
20 partner with that. If you have any other
21 questions, please feel free to just give us a
22 call and let us know. You do have our cards.
23 Thank you very much.

24 MR. PETERS: Thank you, sir.

25 MR. FONTE: Thank you.

1 MS. WERREN: Thank you.

2 MR. PETERS: Anyone else wishing to
3 address Council?

4 Larry, you are up.

5 MR. TRIPP: Larry Tripp, 1127 East Maple,
6 North Canton. Much to the ire of one
7 Councilman, The Repository, a couple months
8 ago, published my letter to the editor,
9 titled, "Appointment of Council Clerk in
10 North Canton hints at insider manipulation."

11 Rest assured, at the appropriate time
12 during this election year, other letters are
13 in the works, expressing my opinion. One
14 good title might be "Does hypocrisy run
15 rampant in North Canton government?" Another
16 letter might be titled, "Does North Canton
17 government use bullying and intimidation in
18 their government practice?"

19 The last leads me to my recollection
20 three years ago, June 2016. I, along with
21 Mr. Rod Covey -- remember him -- was
22 approached by our Law Director in a very
23 unprofessional manner following a meeting at
24 Dogwood Park. A physical confrontation could
25 have easily played out, after I challenged

1 him as to why he was trying to bully and
2 intimidate us. Only when I threatened to
3 call the police did he scurry away like a
4 scared weasel.

5 I made a -- I personally made a
6 terrible -- terrible mistake by not calling
7 the police. But my rationale at that time
8 was that it would have been an embarrassment
9 to the City. Like I said, a terrible mistake
10 on my part, after subsequently watching two
11 individuals, alias, Mutt and Jeff, from a
12 comic strip of years gone by, continue to
13 make a mockery of sound government practice
14 in North Canton.

15 Then I only furthered my mistake by
16 conveying this problem to the Mayor, who
17 stated he would discuss this with the
18 individual in question. Mr. Mayor, based on
19 his conduct up until a couple months ago,
20 when, as I understand, he was counsel --
21 counselled on his job performance, I can't
22 believe you backed up your words to me.

23 I'm a senior citizen, a United States
24 Army veteran, and damn proud of it. Two
25 weeks ago, this country honored, with many

1 somber ceremonies, those deceased who served
2 our country with pride, dignity, dedication,
3 and bravery. Thank you, Mr. Mayor, for your
4 kind words as I listened to your remarks on
5 Memorial Day. But, Mr. Mayor, as I reflect
6 back on North Canton government, hostile
7 attitude towards me, a veteran, Mr. Osborne,
8 a veteran, senior citizens, and the likes of
9 Mrs. Rolls and Mrs. Baughman included, I
10 believe your remarks to be words and only
11 words.

12 Then just last week, June 6th, the 75th
13 anniversary of D-Day, we honored those
14 veterans, the living and deceased, who
15 stormed the beaches of Normandy. We watched
16 a 97-year veteran proudly paratroop to nearly
17 the same location he landed as a member of
18 his airborne division nearly 75 years ago.
19 This time, he enjoyed his jump as he landed
20 in a peace time environment and not facing
21 enemy fire.

22 We visualize those -- the bravery of
23 those storming the beaches, bullets hitting
24 their landing craft, some heroes killed
25 instantly as their landing crafts opened.

1 Did they quit? No. We know they prevailed.
2 And those who survived came home to some
3 initial fanfare, settled into the American
4 way of life, and became part of one of the
5 greatest generations known to this country,
6 as labeled by Tom Brokaw, former NBC
7 analyst -- anchor.

8 I have spoke often with utter disgust of
9 the -- utter disgust of the actions displayed
10 by this City government during the past six
11 years. Led by Council President and the Law
12 Director, you embarked on a mission to
13 destroy the likes of Chuck Osborne, Larry
14 Tripp, or anyone displaying the initiative to
15 question your personal agendas. Quite a
16 contrast to those honored the past couple
17 weeks.

18 Mr. Revoldt, since you weren't in office
19 six years ago, let me please excuse you from
20 my next remark to Council.

21 MR. PETERS: Mr. Tripp, your time is up.

22 MR. TRIPP: Silenced on this matter
23 isn't --

24 MR. PETERS: Mr. Tripp --

25 MR. TRIPP: -- is not golden.

1 MR. PETERS: Mr. Tripp --

2 MR. TRIPP: It only gets -- illustrates a
3 matter of fact and truth.

4 MR. PETERS: I'm going to ask you to sit
5 down.

6 MR. TRIPP: Thank you.

7 MR. FONTE: Larry, thank you for your
8 service.

9 MR. TRIPP: I don't need thank you.
10 Those that died --

11 MR. PETERS: Thank you, Larry.

12 MR. TRIPP: -- are the ones that need
13 thanking.

14 MR. PETERS: Thank you, Larry.

15 MR. TRIPP: He addressed me.

16 MR. PETERS: Thank you, sir.

17 Anyone else wishing to address Council,
18 please step forward.

19 (No response.)

20 MR. PETERS: Seeing none, we will --

21 MR. FOLTZ: This gentleman right here.

22 MR. PETERS: Oh, yeah. Yes, please.

23 Dave, come on forward.

24 MR. LINSENBIGLER: Good evening,
25 everyone. May I approach the Council, sir?

1 MR. PETERS: You have a handout?

2 MR. LINSENBIGLER: Yeah.

3 MR. PETERS: If you want to put it on the
4 table there, we'll have --

5 MS. WERREN: Why doesn't he pass them --

6 MR. FONTE: Here, I'll take one.

7 MR. PETERS: You have copies for
8 everyone?

9 MR. FONTE: Thank you, sir.

10 MR. LINSENBIGLER: I need one. There is
11 a spare one in there. Thank you. Well, once
12 again, I'm back to talk to you. On January
13 1, 2017, two laws were passed for operation
14 of slow moving vehicles in Ohio by the Ohio
15 Revised Code in Columbus and Stark County.
16 They both approved it.

17 And I believe the last time I was here --
18 or I know the last time I was here, my
19 request to have golf carts permitted to
20 operate within the -- the City limits of
21 North Canton was denied. There may have --
22 this may have been due to some
23 misinterpretation of information that was
24 available, if you would have done the
25 homework on your own, instead of asking

1 someone else what they thought.

2 Golf carts can't be used on roads with
3 speed limits exceeding 35 miles an hour.
4 Local governments have to approve use on
5 public roads. I think that's a good thing.
6 The City of Columbus said we can do this in
7 Ohio. Stark County says we can do it in
8 Stark County. But the cities, the
9 municipalities, such as North Canton, can
10 either approve or deny this action. I'm for
11 that. That's the will of the people; vote
12 yes, vote no. I'm asking you to vote yes.

13 Safety inspections -- and I think this is
14 where maybe some lines got crossed. On --
15 before you -- before you, you have a list
16 that shows what is required for a golf cart
17 just to get the title. The inspection, which
18 I have provided a name for you, is done by a
19 sheriff's deputy. Stark County Sheriff will
20 come to your house at no charge, inspect your
21 cart. He throws a State inspection sticker
22 on your front windshield, lower left-hand
23 corner, signs off on the inspection paper.

24 You can then go and apply for your title.
25 After your title, you have to get your

1 insurance. Of course, you have to have a
2 driver's license. There is age restrictions.
3 If you look at the laws under Ohio Revised
4 Code 4501-30-02, approved operating equipment
5 and everything, it's all listed on there.
6 You must -- you must take the bill of sale,
7 the inspection sheet, and insurance card.

8 They don't ask you to sign a waiver that
9 says do you have insurance. You have to show
10 the insurance card. That's the first time in
11 my 67 years -- 76 years here in Ohio that I
12 have been asked for an actual insurance card.
13 Here, sign a waiver. Tell me you got
14 insurance. I don't trust people that much.
15 I'd rather see the card, which they make me
16 do for my golf cart.

17 Then you pay your taxes, you get your
18 plates, you get your bill, and you can do it.
19 I understand some of your -- some of your
20 thoughts and some of your words. You are
21 worried about traffic on Main Street. Fine.
22 Put a stipulation in your ordinance; Main
23 Street can't be used by utility vehicles, as
24 stated in the Ohio Revised Code, between the
25 hours of 7:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.

1 But you are not stopping me from crossing
2 it. I don't use Main Street. I don't use
3 Portage Avenue. You people did me a favor,
4 like when -- on Charlotte, you dropped the
5 speed limit down to 30 miles an hour and that
6 stuff, because you gave me permission to ride
7 the street. But I can't take my vehicle
8 there, because you won't give me permission
9 to use my vehicle. And, quickly, I'll just
10 say -- I'll let you read that, because you
11 all have a copy of it.

12 I did have a garage sale, like I said the
13 last time. I had had four people from North
14 Canton inquire about my golf cart. And the
15 one thing I hated to do is three people I
16 turned down. The fourth man, I hated to turn
17 down. His daughter brought him there to look
18 at the golf cart, because he is handicap.
19 And I refused to sell it to him. Why?
20 Because I already know what your stipulations
21 are. Your stipulations say no. And I didn't
22 figure it was fair to take the man's money.

23 MR. PETERS: Thank you, Dave.

24 MR. LINSENBIGLER: So I just -- I just
25 ask you, again, please consider this. And

1 this time maybe someone could have the
2 courtesy to let me know which way you may
3 decide on whether we could use a golf cart in
4 the City of North Canton or not.

5 MR. PETERS: Thank you, Dave. Thank you.

6 MR. FONTE: Thank you very much.

7 MR. PETERS: We can talk after the
8 meeting.

9 MR. LINSENBIGLER: Okay.

10 MR. PETERS: Thank you, sir.

11 Anyone else wishing to address Council,
12 step forward, state your name and address.

13 (No response.)

14 MR. PETERS: Now seeing none, we will
15 move on to old business. May I have a
16 motion -- Steph, are we -- before we do this,
17 what are we going to do with this here, 28
18 and 29? Are we --

19 MS. WERREN: I think we have some changes
20 that we would like them to put in writing
21 before we look at it again. We had another
22 report that was done this week, and I think
23 that they addressed a lot of the issues from
24 that report.

25 And, really, we are going to do those

1 things that they talked about in the report
2 anyways, the feasibility study, to working
3 with Rob on the low interest loan that we
4 would need to have done by, I think, October.
5 So the timing with our break, we still need
6 to move on some things, but I think that we'd
7 be more comfortable if all that was in
8 writing. I know Daryl met with them and the
9 Mayor met with them. So I think we did get a
10 lot of questions answered. I don't know.
11 Any other thoughts? Daryl, did you have
12 anything or --

13 MR. REVOLDT: Just to say timing -- I
14 think timing is -- is an issue. What we
15 might do is ask Johnson Controls have any
16 additional information to us and hold a
17 special meeting next Monday night for the
18 third and final vote.

19 MR. PETERS: Laura, did you get that?

21 on hand. So you'll need a motion on that
22 matter. Just put this on the table.

6 know you can't throw a pizza box away with a
7 greasy wax paper in it? Like, is there more
8 education there?

9 MR. DEORIO: Yes, sir.

10 MR. FONTE: Because like I say --

11 MR. DEORIO: It's part of the bid specs.
12 I have included an educational component that
13 we didn't have before.

14 MR. FONTE: Because, I mean, honestly, I
15 think it's pretty surprising that, you know,
16 if you don't rinse out your wine bottle or
17 your pop bottle or whatever, they can't use
18 it. So I think those things are important,
19 if we are going to try to get some benefit
20 out of the recycling.

14 matters. It is a legal process by which an
15 arbitrator or a judge reviews evidence and
16 argumentation, including legal reasoning set
17 forth by opposing parties or litigants, to
18 come to a decision which determines rights
19 and obligations between the parties.

20 And I think that's the biggest issue we
21 have is it's pretty -- these are pretty
22 important hearings. These are the rights of
23 the property owners. And they can be
24 appealed. And they aren't coming back to us.
25 Thank God. They are going to a court of law.

1 And if -- if we have people on the record
2 giving us their opinion, that is extremely
3 subjective, in most cases. If you are the
4 property owner or beside somebody, around
5 somebody, you want the law and you want
6 proof. You don't want just opinion.

7 And I think by calling it adjudication
8 hearing and making the people know that what
9 they say is on the record, and it is proof
10 and can end up in a court of law, I think it
11 makes it more -- has more validity to it, and
12 it -- it protects the property owners.

13 MR. PETERS: I agree. Daryl.

14 MR. REVOLDT: Just to amplify Marcia's
15 comment, there is ample case law here in Ohio
16 on these matters, particularly for issues
17 before Zoning Board of Appeals and for
18 conditional uses, that require an oath.
19 Matters before a Planning Commission, public
20 opinion is welcome. But, again, we are --
21 we, the City, are attempting to align our
22 practices and the expectation is set in the
23 ordinance that the courts require oath.

24 MR. PETERS: Agree.

1 are often subject to litigation on matters,
2 sometimes controversial, I think it's
3 imperative that we align our practices with
4 the court's expectations.

18 probably seen the substation. So a great
19 collaboration with Rice's Nursery, the North
20 Canton Garden Club. They planted some nice
21 burning bush and some dwarf plants there,
22 planted some boulders, just to try to make a
23 substation in a residential area a little
24 prettier. So it was really nice and I'm
25 really proud of that; zero cost to the City.

1 AEP covered that all, Rice's Nursery.

2 Also, mark your calendars now. This is
3 an event open to everybody here, as well as
4 all the public. Akron Children's Hospital is
5 inviting us to celebrate the grand opening.
6 And that's going to be on Saturday, June
7 22nd, 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. The ribbon
8 cutting will be at 11:00 a.m. That's -- it's
9 free, open to the public; features a
10 self-guided tour, family entertainment, and
11 light refreshments. So Saturday, June 22nd.
12 That's all I have.

13 MR. PETERS: Thank you.

14 Engineer Graham.

15 MR. GRAHAM: Thank you, Mr. President. I
16 guess I'm happy to report kind of our first
17 wave of four projects are basically about
18 done. Our Elmwood water line is completely
19 done, the punch list. Our Price Park, south
20 track, walking path is done, other than some
21 very minor punch list there.

22 Our 2019 paving program is completely
23 done, with the exception of twelve Mr.
24 Manhole methods. And that's going to
25 happen -- it was suppose to happen today, but

1 tomorrow and Wednesday. So that one is real
2 close to being knocked out.

3 And then the last project on that first
4 wave is the Eastbury water line project, and
5 that's probably got maybe two more weeks. We
6 are getting real close. That's been dragging
7 on since about January. But the residents
8 have been great out there. So that's almost
9 done.

10 I guess we are ready to start our second
11 wave of projects. Some more havoc I can
12 wreak elsewhere in town. The biggest one
13 started last week, the Glenwood water line
14 replacement that's going to serve our three
15 medical facilities down there. Actually,
16 four, with Mercy on the north side. That got
17 started last week. So far, so good. No
18 surprises.

19 We are having our pre-construction
20 meeting tomorrow for our Weber Avenue
21 reconstruction. We talked a lot about that
22 one in the last year or so, and the needs out
23 there. And then when our Eastbury job is
24 done, the same contractor has our Watkins
25 Lorrell water line we talked about. That's

1 going to get started hopefully in the next
2 couple of weeks. So we'll shift our mayhem
3 from one part of town to another.

4 And later in the summer, we've got a
5 third wave of projects we can talk about.
6 Other than that, if there are any questions,
7 please --

8 MR. PETERS: Yeah, and Pat put out a road
9 closure. We can share that on our Web site
10 and Facebook and all that, too?

11 MR. DEORIO: Yeah. Uh-huh.

12 MR. PETERS: Okay. And, Rob, I had
13 another question.

14 MR. GRAHAM: Uh-huh.

15 MR. PETERS: I know it's not in the City
16 of North Canton, but the -- the trail where
17 you connect from Washington Square there,
18 over to the high school, GlenOak High
19 School --

20 MR. GRAHAM: Uh-huh.

21 MR. PETERS: -- do you have any idea when
22 that leg is going to --

23 MR. GRAHAM: I can check with Stark Parks
24 and see. I know they have been working --
25 yeah, get that connected from Hoover to

1 Washington Square to -- I can check on that.

2 MR. PETERS: Okay.

3 MR. GRAHAM: I don't know off the top of
4 my head.

5 MR. PETERS: No big deal. I just had
6 some questions from constituents.

7 MR. GRAHAM: Yeah, absolutely. I know
8 they are excited, because, eventually, it's
9 going to lead into Gervasi's Vineyard and
10 some other places; so --

11 MR. PETERS: Yeah.

12 MR. GRAHAM: Going to make it a lot
13 easier --

14 MR. PETERS: Oh, man. No doubt. It's
15 going to be cool. All right. Thank you.

16 Mr. Mayor.

17 MR. HELD: Yes. I would like to
18 introduce our intern -- one of our interns.
19 Ben, you were just walking out there.

20 MR. PETERS: You tried to get out of
21 here.

22 MR. HELD: That's right. That's right.
23 Ben -- Ben is a -- Ben, why don't you
24 introduce yourself? You are a senior --
25 you're going to be a senior this year at

1 Walsh?

2 MR. YOUNG: I'll be a senior at Walsh,
3 where I'll be studying political science.

4 MR. HELD: Okay. And can you tell us
5 some of the projects you are working on for
6 us right now? I mean, Ben is incredible. I
7 mean, this young man is a -- is a policy
8 machine. So he has already put together --
9 putting together -- well, in the process of
10 putting together the policy for the
11 sidewalks. Right?

12 MR. YOUNG: Sidewalk replacement, cost
13 sharing program.

14 MR. HELD: Cost sharing program. And
15 your major, again, at Walsh is?

16 MR. YOUNG: Political science.

17 MR. HELD: Political science. And
18 statistics, right? You love statistics.

19 MR. YOUNG: Yes. My true passion is
20 statistics. I have a minor in economics, and
21 I would major in that if we had an economics
22 major.

23 MR. HELD: Yes. And so, you know, Ben --
24 Ben is doing an incredible job. I mean, it's
25 amazing what one individual can put together

1 and -- you know, for the City. So it's --
2 he's -- you are really doing excellent.

3 One of the things -- one of the
4 projects -- we have the sidewalks. What
5 else? Funding grants, the --

6 MR. YOUNG: The CIC grants this year.
7 I've been working on the parks expansion
8 right now.

9 MR. HELD: Parks expansion. And the
10 other one that I find fascinating, because
11 this is something -- something we have wanted
12 to do, and it's something new, is the
13 registration of security cameras.

14 MR. YOUNG: Private security cameras.
15 It's a list that the police can access that
16 says residents have cameras. But police
17 can't access private cameras directly. They
18 still have to request footage from the
19 private residents. But it let's people in
20 North Canton tell the police that they are
21 willing to help if a crime is committed in
22 their area.

23 MR. HELD: So you have, like, the Ring
24 cameras. You have the -- the Nest cameras.
25 I mean, there are so many different camera

1 systems. But if they register them with the
2 police, then if there is a crime in that
3 particular area -- because I know with
4 Council, we've talked about having cameras,
5 you know, in major intersections and moving
6 to have them in all the intersections, for
7 not only, you know, crime, but, you know, to
8 register who's coming through and so forth,
9 if there is -- in the event that there is a
10 crime.

11 Well, this goes well beyond it. Because
12 now we'll have access. They'll provide
13 willing access to their own private security
14 cameras, which we can't get any better than
15 that. And so Ben is putting that policy
16 together. And you are just doing a really
17 impressive job.

18 MR. YOUNG: Thank you very much.

19 MR. HELD: And so with that, now you
20 can --

21 MR. FONTE: Thanks.

22 MS. KIESLING: Bye.

23 MR. FONTE: Thank you, Ben.

24 MR. PETERS: Thank you, Ben. Welcome
25 aboard.

1 MR. HELD: He has got work to do. He's
2 working over at Walsh, too. So he's a busy
3 man. He said he couldn't stay for the
4 whole -- the whole meeting. Yeah, and he's
5 working. So he's got -- yeah, so he's got --
6 he's just incredible. Excellent, excellent
7 job.

8 MR. PETERS: Good stuff. All set?

9 MR. HELD: Uh-huh. All done.

10 MR. PETERS: Director of Administration.

11 MR. DEORIO: Very briefly. I want to
12 talk about Council's meeting schedule. When
13 you get to that point, I would like that we
14 add a regular meeting to the June 17th date,
15 and also to the July 1st date. Two items
16 that you already have before you would be --
17 on the Witwer zoning, we would like to get
18 that passed by June 24th. So if you can
19 accommodate the -- the homeowner there.

20 And it turns out, there is another parcel
21 that's for sale now -- two parcels for sale
22 now that are affected, that are in the list,
23 that weren't when we started this process.
24 And they would be able to list their property
25 and get it going without tying this thing up

1 too much longer. So if we could do that.

2 And then with the action that you guys
3 are taking with Johnson Controls, you were
4 going to do a meeting anyway. So I'd like to
5 tag the Witwer in. And then if we get into
6 anything else that comes up, I'll let you
7 know.

8 MR. PETERS: Pat, at that point -- I'm
9 glad you brought that up. I'm looking here.
10 We have a Special Council meeting --

11 MR. DEORIO: Okay. You got that on --

12 MR. PETERS: -- listed on here. Did
13 we --

14 MS. BROWN: Yeah, that was for the Witwer
15 zoning. We talked about --

16 MR. DEORIO: Okay. Perfect.

17 MS. BROWN: -- that. But we can add
18 Johnson to that.

19 MR. PETERS: Without amending to -- okay.
20 We got it. So the meeting is already there.
21 Okay. Got it. Thank you, Pat.

22 MR. DEORIO: And then either on the July
23 1st or July 8th meeting, I would like to get,
24 if I can coordinate the schedule -- a
25 representative from the federal government in

1 the U.S. Census Bureau would like to talk to
2 City Council about the upcoming 2020 census,
3 and what they are trying to do and how we in
4 North Canton can help them get an accurate
5 count in our City.

6 MS. WERREN: Okay.

7 MR. REVOLDT: That representative will be
8 a U.S. citizen, correct? That's
9 tongue-in-cheek.

10 MR. DEORIO: Yeah. I don't find it very
11 amusing, quite frankly.

12 MR. REVOLDT: I'm just joking.

13 MR. FONTE: Moving on.

14 MR. PETERS: Either one, Pat. Whatever
15 you want, the 1st or the 8th.

16 MR. DEORIO: Well, I've got to -- I just
17 want to put you on notice. I'll send a
18 request over when I know for sure what date
19 he has picked.

20 MR. PETERS: Sounds good to me.

21 MR. DEORIO: Okay. Thank you. That's
22 it.

23 MR. PETERS: All right. Very good.
24 Director of Finance.

25 MS. BROWN: Just to follow up on the

1 meeting schedule -- Tim and I were just
2 conferring -- the Special Council meeting
3 next week was just for the zoning. So you
4 may want to vote to add Johnson Controls to
5 that.

6 MR. FOX: Just do a roll call vote.

7 MR. PETERS: Okay.

8 MS. BROWN: And then to follow up on
9 Patrick, on July 1st, we are anticipating
10 probably needing a Special Council meeting
11 after Committee that night, as well, for some
12 of the things that are coming up in the next
13 Committee meeting, to get those done by
14 summer recess.

15 MR. PETERS: On July 1st?

16 MS. BROWN: We can, you know, talk about
17 that at the next meeting, as well.

18 MR. REVOLDT: Let me do this then. Let
19 me make a motion to add to the existing
20 July -- June 17th meeting a third vote for
21 Ordinances 28-2019 and 29-2019, the Johnson
22 Control ordinances.

23 MR. PETERS: That's a motion.

24 MR. FOLTZ: Second.

25 MR. PETERS: All in favor?

1 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.
2 MR. PETERS: Aye.
3 MR. CERRETA: Aye.
4 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.
5 MS. KIESLING: Aye.
6 MS. WERREN: Aye.
7 MR. FONTE: Aye.
8 MR. PETERS: Opposed?
9 (No response.)
10 MR. PETERS: Motion carries.
11 And while we are at it, why don't we just
12 go ahead and have a motion and a second to
13 include a Special Council meeting July 1st?
14 And what was the --
15 MR. FOLTZ: With agenda to follow?
16 MS. BROWN: Subject to follow --
17 MR. PETERS: Subject to -- okay.
18 MR. REVOLDT: So moved.
19 MS. WERREN: Second.
20 MR. PETERS: All in favor?
21 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.
22 MR. PETERS: Aye.
23 MR. CERRETA: Aye.
24 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.
25 MS. KIESLING: Aye.

1 MS. WERREN: Aye.
2 MR. FONTE: Aye.
3 MR. PETERS: Opposed?
4 (No response.)
5 MR. PETERS: Motion carries.
6 Thank you, Laura. You got anything else?
7 MS. BROWN: That's all. Thank you.
8 MR. PETERS: Director of Law.
9 MR. FOX: No report, sir.
10 MR. PETERS: Okay. Member Foltz.
11 MR. FOLTZ: No report.
12 MR. PETERS: Member Cerreta.
13 MR. CERRETA: No report.
14 MR. PETERS: Member Revoldt, you want to
15 talk about Jaycee fair or --
16 MR. REVOLDT: No, I don't.
17 MR. PETERS: Oh, okay.
18 MR. REVOLDT: But because I'm an old
19 guy --
20 MR. CERRETA: It's raining.
21 MR. REVOLDT: It's raining. I would like
22 the record to reflect this evening that
23 Richard Waltenbaugh, who served this
24 community as member of Council for four
25 terms, passed away this last week. He

1 preceded, by a number of years, my
2 participation. But, obviously, the voters
3 had a great deal of confidence in him to
4 return him on a number of occasions. So I
5 think our condolences go out to his family.

6 The second thing I would like to say
7 is -- to Mr. Linsenbigler is that I am not
8 convinced that we should permit golf carts on
9 our streets. I think you have done a really
10 terrific job making a case that golf carts
11 can be made somewhat safe.

12 But the fact of the matter is, as I look
13 at some research, one of the principal
14 issues -- and it's actually reflected on the
15 very document you provide us -- is that the
16 State standards leave out one very important
17 component to the safety equipment, and that
18 is a rollover bar; that when you look at many
19 of the fatalities associated with the use of
20 golf carts on public streets, they are
21 associated with a rollover, where the --
22 where the occupants are ejected or crushed by
23 the vehicle itself.

24 The second thing I would also point out
25 is that -- must not be able to travel faster

1 than 20 miles per hour. When you look at
2 many of the connectors in this community, not
3 only Main Street, but Applegrove, Everhard,
4 Glenwood, East and West Maple, that traffic
5 moves at 35 miles an hour. That is
6 significantly faster than 20.

7 And as one who exits quiet Ambler Avenue
8 regularly on Everhard Road, I can tell you
9 that a 20 mile an hour vehicle would have a
10 safety issue on that street. Even though a
11 lot of cars are moving at the speed limit,
12 I'm going to bet you, David, we pass out a
13 fair number of tickets on that street, well
14 in excess of 35 miles an hour. I think it
15 would be very, very troublesome for public
16 safety on that street.

17 I think the third thing is this -- and I
18 just picked up -- while you were talking, I
19 was looking at -- looking at a report from
20 the Consumer Product Safety Commission on the
21 number of accidents and fatalities. And I
22 pulled up a -- pulled up a number from 2016
23 in the villages, where golf carts are fairly
24 prevalent. In that year alone, it reported
25 94 EMS calls on its golf carts, 70 of which

1 were fatalities.

2 Now, why is that of interest to us?
3 Because we know that every EMS call costs the
4 taxpayers money in this town, that we only
5 recover from insurance a very small
6 percentage of the actual cost of driving the
7 bus to the hospital.

8 MR. HELD: Daryl, could you state that
9 again? What was the -- those accidents, were
10 those involved with a motor vehicle?

11 MR. REVOLDT: Some were motor vehicles.
12 Others were driving off the road. I think
13 one of them may have been a pedestrian who
14 was hit by -- by -- they were walking in
15 the -- in the golf cart lane and --

16 MR. HELD: How many were fatalities?

17 MR. REVOLDT: They weren't fatalities.
18 There were 94 EMS calls -- 94 -- 70 of which
19 involved injuries.

20 MR. HELD: Okay.

21 MR. REVOLDT: So even though I suspect
22 they are making the vehicles themselves safe,
23 the point is, David, that the operating
24 environment may not be. I think there is a
25 real distinction there as we look at -- as we

1 would consider permitting this. Is this a
2 safe operating environment to ride in?

3 Very few people, for example, ride
4 bicycles on Everhard Road. There is a reason
5 for it. Even though they are permitted under
6 law, even though the law says you have to
7 maintain a 3-foot clearance, we generally
8 don't want to encourage that. So I'm not
9 quite there yet. I have got an open mind.
10 But you haven't closed the sale with one guy
11 here. I'll give you the response. That's
12 where we are. I'm -- I'm still a no. But
13 I'm open -- I'm open to deliberation. That's
14 my report.

15 MR. PETERS: Daryl, you were in the
16 meeting. We had Police Chief Minock here, as
17 well.

18 MR. REVOLDT: Absolutely.

19 MR. PETERS: And he echoed all of your
20 comments. He was adamantly opposed to that
21 for safety reasons.

22 MR. REVOLDT: Yeah, I think they are
23 just -- you know, as you look -- again, you
24 go to Google, and it's the source of all
25 knowledge. You know, candidly, part of the

1 problem is -- is that you can put lights, you
2 can put brakes, you can put a horn on them,
3 but you can't make them really safe in a --
4 in a collision with a vehicle or if the -- if
5 the golf cart goes off the road and really is
6 at speed and hits somebody. And that's a
7 problem. So that's it.

8 MR. PETERS: Thank you.

9 Member Kiesling.

10 MS. KIESLING: No report.

11 MR. PETERS: Member Werren.

12 MS. WERREN: The pickleball person left.
13 But I appreciate all his stats and all the
14 activity that's happening over there. I just
15 got an e-mail today from a woman that I had
16 stopped -- I think it was Memorial Day
17 weekend -- and they were using it, and she
18 just thanked me again for the courts and for
19 us thinking about that, and just how much fun
20 they have been having. She did reiterate
21 again that they would love a bathroom at some
22 point. And if at some point, we say, hey, we
23 need eight courts, obviously, maybe a
24 bathroom becomes important over there.

25 But that's just so fun to hear all those

1 people. And they're right; there are
2 restaurants around there. Walgreen's is
3 probably getting more business and Ro's and
4 different things. I know when I have gone
5 by, they really are busy.

6 You know, in hindsight, yes, I guess we
7 should have, you know, consulted with --

8 MR. HELD: We didn't know.

9 MS. WERREN: Right.

10 MR. DEORIO: It won't be our only one.

11 MS. WERREN: Right. Right. I know, I
12 was down looking at the ones that always have
13 the water. I was like, what can we do down
14 there? Because they are just sitting there
15 with so much water.

16 But it is big. I have to say, I just
17 bought my own pickleball rackets today, and
18 they are not cheap. And I did a lot of
19 Google searches. So my dad will be getting
20 another set for Father's Day, and Curt
21 doesn't know it yet --

22 MR. HELD: He knows now.

23 MS. WERREN: Yep.

24 THE REPORTER: He's getting one, too?

25 MS. WERREN: Exactly. He doesn't play.

1 Sorry. So -- so it was really exciting to
2 hear about that.

3 And thanks to Johnson Controls for
4 spending the time, just keeping us informed.
5 And after the report that we looked at, I
6 mean, they agreed with a lot of the points.
7 And I think what they are going to say is,
8 hey, we do a lot of this and we take the time
9 and effort that's necessary to make sure it's
10 right, to, you know, Mark, thinking about do
11 we need -- what kind of sludge press and the
12 differences, the one or two. That's all part
13 of the process.

14 MR. HELD: Exactly.

15 MS. WERREN: They are not to that. I
16 mean, they need to do that and research it,
17 and then give us the say to say -- and to --
18 Mark, also to you, to say which one do we
19 want. But I think the report was clear in
20 saying we have to do something. Our lagoons
21 are full. And the time is now.

22 So I think what their goal is, they are
23 going to give us a new amended report. Take
24 a look at that this week, and then we'll come
25 back and we can discuss it next week. But I

1 know in talking to Rob and then talking with
2 you, some of those grants and some things, we
3 just need to think about that in the process.
4 So that's it.

5 MR. PETERS: Okay. Member Fonte.

6 MR. FONTE: I want to thank all the men,
7 service men and women for all what they have
8 done to give us freedoms, and also remind the
9 Administrator over there that the flags are
10 coming quickly. We've got to get the rest of
11 those flags out. So I'm free on a Saturday,
12 if you need a little extra help. So the
13 flags look nice. I got a lot of good
14 comments, by the way. Did anybody get any
15 comments on them?

16 MR. PETERS: They did, yeah.

17 MR. FONTE: Daryl is saying no. You need
18 to get out more often, buddy. So -- and I
19 wanted to say that there are still a few more
20 roads that need some attention. I know the
21 project wrapped up. And I looked at the
22 budget. It looked like there was going to be
23 about \$500,000 in the gas tax. Are we all
24 going to get 100 percent of that for the
25 roads, so next year, we can have a decent

1 budget to get these roads caught up? You
2 don't have to answer if you don't want, but
3 that's just something on my mind. And --

4 MR. HELD: Can you tell them that? Tell
5 him that. Dominic, he has the -- Rob has the
6 answer to that.

7 MR. GRAHAM: Estimates for City of North
8 Canton from the State are \$376,000 for next
9 year.

10 MR. FONTE: Okay.

11 MR. GRAHAM: The taxes don't go into
12 effect until July 1st.

13 MR. FONTE: Oh, I got you. So I'm
14 hoping, because there are some serious roads,
15 even in my ward, that look like -- they are
16 pretty rough.

17 MR. DEORIO: And you recall Finance
18 Director Brown's comments when you asked the
19 question the last time that --

20 MR. FONTE: I probably forgot.

21 MR. DEORIO: -- that by statute, we would
22 have to give it all to the roads.

23 MR. FONTE: I know.

24 MR. DEORIO: Okay.

25 MR. FONTE: And then there is some sewer

1 money coming, too, I saw. So does that go to
2 the roads, as well? So next year, we should
3 be up close to a million dollars for the
4 budget --

5 MR. HELD: Uh-huh.

6 MR. FONTE: -- instead of 580-. Is that
7 what it was this year, 580-? That's okay.
8 Never mind.

9 MR. GRAHAM: Well, we also have a lot of
10 road reconstructions. So when we look at the
11 budget, it's --

12 MR. FONTE: Okay. I just -- I just want
13 to stay on top of the roads. Because since
14 we've had such --

15 MR. GRAHAM: Any --

16 THE REPORTER: Wait.

17 MR. FONTE: Since we have had such cold
18 weather, without the --

19 MS. WERREN: We get it.

20 MR. FONTE: -- the upgrade, it's -- they
21 are not lasting, unfortunately. So I'm just
22 saying, next year, I want to be well planned.
23 Thank you.

24 MR. PETERS: Outstanding. All right.

25 Final call to Council for new business.

1 MR. REVOLDT: Move adjournment.

2 MS. KIESLING: Second.

3 MR. PETERS: All in favor?

4 MR. FOLTZ: Aye.

5 MR. PETERS: Aye.

6 MR. CERRETA: Aye.

7 MR. REVOLDT: Aye.

8 MS. KIESLING: Aye.

9 MS. WERREN: Aye.

10 MR. FONTE: Aye.

11 MR. PETERS: Opposed?

12 (No response.)

13 MR. PETERS: Motion carries. We are
14 adjourned.




