INTRODUCTION AND LETTER FROM THE CHIEF

The North Canton Police Department is a full-time professional law enforcement organization providing 24-hour service to the citizens of North Canton. The Department is commanded by Chief of Police Michael J. Grimes. He is assisted by his Administrative Assistant and six Lieutenants. Five Lieutenants are assigned to the Uniformed Patrol Division and one to the Detective Bureau. The Uniformed Patrol Division is comprised of eighteen full-time Patrol Officers and two part-time Officers. There is currently one full-time Officer assigned to the DARE program and one assigned to the Detective Bureau.

The Department also operates a 24-hour Dispatch Center. It is comprised of a Chief Dispatcher, six full-time Dispatchers, and two part-time Dispatchers. In addition to the Police Department the Center also handles dispatch responsibilities for the North Canton Fire Department, and North Canton Emergency Medical Service.

The contents of this report represent only a small part of the work done by the members of the Department on a daily basis. We strive to give the best possible service to the community. Working together with the other City Departments and with the support of the City Government and Administration, the citizens of North Canton are in very good hands.

On behalf of the members of the North Canton Police Department, I proudly present the Annual Report to the Mayor that covers the year 2001.

The order of business in 2001 was to continue to fulfill equipment and training needs of the department. In the year 2000 we increased citations approximately 93 %. In 2001 we did not let down in this endeavor and continued our aggressive traffic enforcement.


We started a program of sending our supervisors to highly reputable training courses that will improve our already excellent management practices. We sent several of our officers to a basic special-response school to receive training on the handling of dangerous incidents. We followed the State's recommendation to departments and instituted a professional traffic stop policy that addresses racial bias stops. We continued to replace older equipment such as cruisers, the machine that tests the breath on persons arrested for driving while intoxicated, and computer workstations. New video cameras were installed in the cruisers for the first time. The department now has Internet and electronic mail capabilities. New protective vests were ordered for all officers. We will continue to evaluate our equipment and training needs in 2002.

The department is extremely fortunate to have the support and cooperation of you, your staff, city Council, and the community. We will continue our goal to provide excellent service and protection to the citizens of North Canton.

POLICE ZONES FOR DATA REFERENCE



For patrol and statistical purposes the city is divided up into four quadrants or zones. These zones match the street name direction designators to keep things simple. Depending on the shift and manpower there can be one patrol car assigned to each zone. At the minimum there will be a patrol car assigned to patrol both northern zones and one assigned to patrol both southern zones. In addition to the zone cars, there will be a floating car which will randomly patrol all four zones. Additional cars can be assigned to special patrol duties such as traffic enforcement, neighborhoods, accidents, etc. The Department also employs a bicycle patrol to supplement the normal cruiser based patrol.

The incidence of major crimes committed in the City declined in most areas for the year 2001. Fortunately another year passed without a homicide. There was also a significant decline in the number of burglaries. We have seen an increase in the number of larcenies over the past several years. This can be partially attributed to the increase of the number of retail businesses in the City which has increased the number of shoplifting calls. Many stores have improved their loss prevention techniques and are proceeding with criminal prosecutions on a regular basis.

Criminal Charges and Individual Arrests

Criminal charges are the actual filing of one or more criminal complaints with the court against a person usually in conjunction with the physical arrest of that person. Traffic citations are not considered arrest charges. The only exception is an arrest for driving under the influence of alcohol (DUI), which is filed on a traffic citation. In 2001 there were **696** total criminal charges filed by the Police Department. Of those **525** were filed against adults and **171** filed against juveniles. There were **544** individuals arrested in 2001. Including a total of **406** adult arrests and **138** juvenile arrests. Some of these people were charged with multiple offenses. This represents an increase over the year 2000 in which we had a total of 683 arrest charges filed, 512 against adults and 171 against juveniles.

Criminal Charges and Prosecution

When charges are filed against an adult that person can either be arrested and incarcerated at the Stark County Jail or issued a summons and released. This depends on the type and seriousness of the offense. The Police Department utilizes the North Canton Mayor's Court, the Canton Municipal Court, and the Stark County Common Pleas Court to prosecute criminal offenses. The Massillon Municipal Court is no longer used. Mayor's Court can only try cases that involve violations of the Codified Ordinances of the City of North Canton. The Canton Municipal Court can try cases involving violations of both North Canton City Ordinances and the Ohio Revised Code. The Stark County Common Pleas Court handles felony violations of the Ohio Revised Code.

When charges are filed against a juvenile they can either be arrested and incarcerated at the Multi-County Juvenile Attention Center or sign a Promise to Appear form and be released to a parent /guardian. The Stark County Family Court – Juvenile Division has exclusive jurisdiction to try all juvenile cases.

Traffic Citations – Written Warnings – Parking Tickets

A citation can be issued for a violation of the traffic section of the City Ordinances or the Ohio Revised Code. Mayor's court can only try violations of City Ordinances. The Canton Municipal Court can try violations of both City Ordinances and the Ohio Revised Code. The Stark County Family Court handles all juvenile traffic violations.


Officers have the discretion to issue a written warning for a traffic violation instead of a citation. This is sometimes done for minor offenses, equipment defects, recently expired license plates, or any other offense where a warning will suffice to promote compliance with the traffic code. Warnings are kept on file and the warning file is checked when a driver is stopped by an officer. This helps ensure that the same person does not receive multiple warnings for the same offense.

Parking tickets are issued for various violations of the Parking Ordinance. These include but are not limited to handicapped parking, fire lane, overtime, and no parking zone violations.




TRAFFIC CITATION TOTALS BY YEAR

Traffic Crash Investigation

The Police Department investigated a total of **592** traffic crashes in **2001**. This is a decrease in the number investigated the previous year. The Police Department investigates almost all of the reported crashes that occur within the City. Occasionally a Stark County Sheriff's Deputy or Ohio State Patrol Trooper will happen upon a crash in the City and handle it.

The Department investigates crashes which occur on public (roadway) and private property.

When the investigation indicates that a violation occurred on roadway accidents a citation is normally issued. Citations are not normally issued for private property crashes.

Crashes with a reported injury were down for 2001. Unfortunately there was one fatal crash during the year. The last fatal injury crash previous to this one occurred in 1992.

The majority of the crashes occurred between the hours of 6:01 AM and 10:00 PM. A large part of that majority coming between the hours of 2:01 PM and 6:00 PM.

The most heavily traveled streets in the City also recorded the highest number of crashes for 2001. **North Main Street** had **94** crashes, a large portion of which occurred in the 1200 to 1600 blocks. **South Main Street** had **57** crashes the majority occurring in the 1200 to 1500 blocks. **Everhard Road SW** was the location of **29** crashes with over half occurring in the 100 and 700 blocks. **East Maple Street / Easton Street** recorded **27** crashes, the majority in the 2000 block. **Applegrove Streets NE and NW** round out the top five locations with a total of **20** crashes, the majority in the 100 blocks. These numbers do not include the **107** intersection accidents which were pretty evenly spread out amongst 64 different intersecting streets in the City. The single fatal crash of 2001 occurred at the intersection of North Main Street and Orion Road NE.


The reduction of traffic crashes continues to be a priority for the Department. Targeting high incidence areas for enforcement of the traffic laws is one of the ways we attempt to do this.

There were **140** reported crashes on private property during 2001. The majority of which occurred at the Acme lot at 1474 N. Main St. and the Marc's Plaza at 1664 N. Main St.. Of those, 9 resulted in an injury of some type. The major cause for the private property crashes was improper backing.



S.M.A.R.T. Trailer

The Department utilizes a Speed Monitoring Awareness Radar Trailer to conduct traffic surveys, monitor speeds, and remind motorists of their speed. The trailer consists of a radar unit and a large speed display which shows the motorist's speed. During 2001 the trailer was placed at various streets around the City on a daily basis during the spring and summer months. It was also used for seven site-specific traffic surveys. There were 73 days of surveying done with over 180,656 vehicles logged.

Offense Reports

There were 1553 criminal offenses reported in 2001, in 2000 there were 1476 reported. The chart below shows a comparison of some of the different types between the two years.

Drug Abuse Resistance Education and School Resource Officer

The Police Department has one Officer assigned full-time to the D.A.R.E. program within the school system. In addition to the 5th grade DARE program he teaches a personal safety program to 1st grade students, and a safety belt program to 3rd grade students. There were also two G.R.E.A.T. summer camp sessions held at the Greentown Elementary School.

The 00-01 school year saw **402**, 5th graders complete the DARE program. **421**, 1st graders completed the safety program and **404**, 3rd graders completed the safety belt program. There were **130** students who attended the GREAT summer camp. Since 1992 there have been **3878** graduates from the DARE program.

The Department received a grant from the State of Ohio this year for the DARE program in the amount of \$10442.00. This money was applied toward wages for the DARE Officer.

The 3rd grade safety belt program is run through the Ohio Department of Highway Safety. The Police Department received \$708.00 from that program.

The Department also has an Officer assigned part-time as a School Resource Officer. He works within the schools on a daily basis as a liaison between the Department and the School System. He handles most school related incidents and works closely with the school administration to resolve problems.

Alarms

The Police Department received **1152** alarm calls from over **450** sites during **2001**. This is down slightly from the 1206 alarm calls from over 350 sites in 2000. The majority of these alarms were false or accidental. However each must be handled as a real alarm for the protection of the officer as well as the public. This is a very time consuming process for the Department and utilizes a vast amount of


resources. Steps are taken by the Department to reduce the number of false alarms by working with those locations that have a high number.

Calls For Service

A Call For Service (CFS) is a computer entry by the dispatcher on incidents that officers respond to, traffic stops, calls from citizens, EMS & Fire calls, hazards, arrests, other Agencies using our equipment such as the BAC Datamaster machine, and other things that the dispatcher or supervisor deem necessary. The CFS system allows the Department to track many items and insures an adequate response or check when needed. Calls For Service requiring additional follow-up are monitored by the Patrol Commander to insure that all calls are properly answered. The following chart shows the breakdown for the time of day when calls are received.

Bike Patrol

The Department utilizes a bicycle patrol to supplement the normal cruiser patrol during the spring, summer, and early fall months. There are currently **8** certified bike officers who have attended specialized training. The Department has 2 Trek, police-model patrol bikes. During 2001 there were **692** patrol hours logged by the bike patrol. The bike unit also hosted a bicycle safety rodeo for the children in the community.

Property Room

The property room is staffed by two Patrolmen and a Lieutenant on a part-time basis. During 2001 they took in over **330** items. Two court orders were obtained for the destruction of evidence and the auctioning of unclaimed items. The destruction occurred at Republic Engineered Steel with drugs, guns, and various other weapons being burned in the steel furnace. A public auction was held at the North Canton Service Center on 08-28-01.

Detective Bureau

There are currently two Officers assigned to the Detective Bureau on a full-time basis, one Lieutenant and one Patrolman. An additional Patrolman is temporarily assigned on an as-needed basis. In addition to investigating criminal offenses they collect crime scene evidence, transport evidence to the crime lab, handle the Crime Watch program, conduct neighborhood surveys following criminal activity, and maintain a liaison with other Departments and businesses. They conduct background investigations on candidates for hire and internal investigations, at the direction of the Chief.

A copy of their report is included with this report. Their case clearance rate for 2001 was 43% which is well above the national average of 20.5%.

Department Training

The Department has several certified instructors who conducted various training classes during the year. These included but were not limited to firearms, less than lethal weapons, radar, laser, video, and L.E.A.D.S..

Additionally various Officers attended training outside the Department. This training covered a wide variety of topics including B.A.C., Drug I.D., CPR, D.U.I. detection, Traffic Crash Investigation, SWAT, Public Records, Internal Investigations, Interviewing, Background Investigation, Management, and continuing Chief's Training.

The Department also has a Field Training Unit which is responsible for the training of all new Officers. It is staffed on a part-time basis by a Lieutenant and five Patrolmen / Field Training Officers. One new Officer was trained by the unit in 2001.

- Ziegler Tire moved from Jackson township to Plain township to clear up a very confused court venue situation.
- A new B.A.C. Datamaster put into service.
- Ptl. Shawn McGuyrt completed probation.
- Dispatcher Lynn Wallace resigned.
- Dispatcher Christine Kardos advanced from part-time to full-time.
- Ptl. Dennis Coy Completed Field Training.
- Dispatchers received in-service and outside training to improve their skills.
- Video Cameras added to all of the marked cruisers.
- Crossing Guard Carlana Chapman resigned and then returned.
- Crossing Guard Janice Whaley resigned.
- Dispatcher Shelley Wolf resigned.
- Push bumpers installed on all of the marked cruisers.
- Lt. Wurgler completed a 10-week Command & Staff School.
- The Rifle Team completed a 1-week special response training school.
- The Detective Bureau solved 2 high profile Gas Station robberies, 1 Bank robbery, and a Home-improvement scam involving the loss of over \$170,000 to 2 victims.
- One formal Citizen complaint still under investigation – results pending.



Please find attached statistical information on the investigations conducted by the Detective Bureau in 2001. During the year, the Detective Bureau became involved in approximately 225 investigations, 204 which were criminal cases. As of this date, January 3, 2002, twenty-four of these cases are still actively being investigated.

While total investigations dropped from 234 in 2000 to 225 in 2001, the number of criminal cases investigated remained the same (204). The Detective Bureau filed criminal charges against 73 people in 2001, and a total of 86 charges were filed. The Detective Bureau cleared 43.14 % of the criminal cases investigated in 2001. In 2000, the Detective Bureau filed criminal charges against 40 people, and a total of 50 charges were filed. We cleared 38.73 % of the criminal cases investigated in 2000.
